Objectives

- Create a forum to discuss current events from multiple perspectives in a focused, informative, deliberative manner.
- Focus on the responsibility each of us has to be informed citizens, highlighting the press and its role in democracy. Examples:
 - The mortgage crisis and its impact on the greater St. Louis metropolitan area.
 - The results are in: Census Numbers Mean BIG Changes for MO

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Constitution Day

- Increasingly student driven.
- Relating constitutional issues to national and state policies
 - 2009: Missouri's conceal and carry law
 - 2010: Constitutional rights and protections
 - 2011: Living and governing in a post 9/11 world
 - Theme for 2012 "Should the 26th Amendment be abolished?"

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Seven Revolutions

- This course was a platform to understand how major global issues affect and can be affected by our state and local communities.
 - A "think globally, act locally" strategy.
- Students' research papers related to one of the "revolutions" and a state or locally based public policy issue.
 - e.g. economic integration = turning St. Louis airport into a regional hub for Chinese imports.

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Service Learning

Honors 2030: Grassroots Democracy

- Required students to commit 15 hours of class time to service learning with Beyond Housing.
- Allowed students to do an additional 120 hours of work for 3 credit hours of independent study/internship credit
- 70% of students did the additional 120 hours

Building a Critical Mass of Engaged Faculty
